Family Planning Needs Assessment	 Jeni McDonald gave an overview of the Title X federal program and the upcoming statewide Family Planning Needs Assessment. Of note: Program provides services such as STI testing, pregnancy testing, contraception, and screening for hypertension with the goal of helping families better plan and space out births. Challenges include health equity, shortage of providers, lack of services for LARCs (Long-Activating Reversible Contraceptive), rise in drug costs, should services include drug use screening, transportation for services They are looking into a mobile command unit but need a champion to bring that forward. It was suggested that PRAMS data be used to inform the assessment. It was suggested that public libraries could be utilized to get information to the public. 	Action Item: KMCHC members are encouraged to provide feedback regarding what the assessment should include.

Panel Discussion: Mental Health in MCH Populations in Kansas	 Kelsee Torrez led a discussion on how people can get trained to support mental health in MCH populations. Below please find highlights from each presenter. Kari Harris, MD - <u>KSKidsMAP</u> KSKidsMAP focuses on training for physicians and clinicians and offers CE credits through ECHO training. Tools kits are also available online. Kelsee Torrez - <u>Kansas Connecting Communities</u> Find <u>information on PRAMS (Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System) here</u> There are only seven women's residential treatment centers in the state and only five provide childcare. A recent mandated reporter training had 450 participants. The state is planning to offer more. 	
	 Meg Hasselman – Kansas Suicide Prevention HQ Kansas Suicide Prevention HQ is the primary 988 hotline center for state (103 of 105 counties). One does not need to be suicidal to call a hotline and can also text to 988. Trainings are conducted in hospitals and other health centers but are also available to anyone. Ann Elifrits- Overdose Data to Action Grant DCCCA is providing free naloxone (Narcan) nasal spray and training to community organizations and any Kansas resident. Screening for SUD in pregnancy needs to improve, but providers don't know what do with that information once they screen.

	Key takeaways for each group are listed below	
Women/Maternal	 Needs assessment for family planning is good; it needs to focus on qualitative data and how that can turn into impact. Many were not aware of the broad definition of provider for some of the KCC and KSKidsMap services. Improved communication is needed to get the information to people who can have an impact. Very difficult to get people to the resources that can help. How can counties rely on each other? Can we use libraries to reach people? Continued funding for mental health services and workforce are a major roadblock. 	
Perinatal/Infant	 More people should be aware of the broad definition of provider for some of these mental health resources. Peers Specialists should have been discussed. Screening is everyone's work. Long-term funding is a roadblock. How do we scale things when they work like community baby showers? 	
Child	KDHE may be able to provide better navigation for parents and providers to deal with insurance especially regarding in-school services. Find ways to attract more medical students to work in mental health and remain in Kansas. This could include student loan forgiveness and more services to support the mental health of mental health providers.	
Adolescent	Resources need to go to more than just doctors.More mobile units are needed.Too much data siloing in communities.Incorporate more voices into planning.Funding continues to be a problem.We need to focus on building infrastructure. There is too much lack of providers.Better promotion of resources to more groups.
